Keynote: Assessment Where Learning Matters

David Marshall, Ph.D., Senior Scholar, National Institute for Learning Outcomes Assessment (NILOA)

David Marshall's academic training is in Medieval Studies, with a Master's degree in Medieval Studies from the University of York, England, and a PhD in Medieval Literature from Indiana University, with a concentration in English and Germanic Philology. His research in that area examines uses of the medieval in contemporary popular culture. A parallel line of research takes a practitioner lens to the uses of learning frameworks and their implications for



assessment. He got his start on this kind of work by taking up issues of alignment with high school, community college, and four-year faculty in the CalPASS project. That work led to his work with the Institute for Evidence-Based Change, facilitating state- and national-scale projects to develop discipline-specific learning outcomes using an approach called Tuning. When the world of Tuning began dovetailing with The Degree Qualifications Profile, his orbit began to intersect with the National Institute for Learning Outcomes Assessment. As a Senior Scholar with NILOA, David has worked on practitioner issues around the use of learning outcomes, particularly as tools for consensus-based praxis. That focus, along with the work on both Tuning and the Degree Qualifications Profile led him to co-author Degrees that Matter: Moving US Higher Education to Learning Systems Paradigm with NILOA Director, Natasha Jankowski. In his day job, David is a faculty member in the English Department at California State University San Bernardino, where he also serves as Director of the University Honors Program.
