Admission and Registration

Admission

- Prospective students of UAA must be admitted to the University before they can register for classes.
- UAA is an Open Enrollment College. To qualify for admission, a student must meet the following requirements:
 - Have earned a high school diploma or the equivalent (GED); or
 - Be 18 years or older and have participated in UAA's assessment; or
 - Qualify under special University Programs; and
 - Complete the Registration Wizard
- Admission applications can be found online at UAOnline.alaska.edu. Left-click on "Apply for Admission or Check on Status of Application". New students should use the "First Time User Account Creation" link at the bottom of the page.
 - Follow the guidelines below to determine the most appropriate Application Type.
 - If your goal is to obtain any degree at UAA, you will want to become a "Degree-Seeking" student. You must be a Degree-Seeking student to qualify for ANY financial aid. The most common Application Types for Degree-Seeking students are: "Associate/Cert" for students seeking a 1-2 year degree (i.e. an Associates Degree or Certificate), "Bachelor" for students seeking a 4 year degree (i.e. a Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts), and "Graduate" for students seeking a Post-Baccalaureate Degree (i.e. a Masters Degree).
 - If your goal is anything other than obtaining a degree at UAA, you will want to become a "Non-Degree-Seeking" student. Non-Degree-Seeking students should choose the "Non-Degree" Application Type. Non-Degree Seeking students are not eligible for ANY financial aid.
 - If you are currently attending high school, or any other secondary school institution, you will want to choose the "Secondary School" Application Type. Please note that this option will not allow you to register for classes online. For more information about the secondary school registration process, please see page 13 of this schedule.
 - All applications must be completed online. There is a one time, non-refundable admission fee for all degree-seeking applications: \$40.00 for Associate Degrees and Certificates/ \$50.00 for Bachelor Degrees.

Registration

- Using our online student database, UAOnline, to register for classes can be a bit tricky the first time around. Follow these step-by-step instructions and you'll be ready to go in no time!
 1. Type UAOnline.alaska.edu into your web browser.
 2. Click on "Login to Secured Area."
 3. Your UA User ID is your eight digit student ID number, which begins with the number "3."
 4. When accessing UAOnline for the first time, your PIN will initially be set to your birth date in a MMDDYY format. For security purposes, your PIN will immediately expire and you will be prompted to change the PIN to a different six character password, which can include numbers, letters, and some symbols. Be sure to create a new PIN that you will REMEMBER!
 5. Following the creation of your new PIN, you will be asked to enter a security question and the answer to that question. If you forget your PIN in the future, you can click on "Forgot PIN?" on the UAOnline User Login page and answer the security question you provided. If the system receives the correct answer, your PIN will be reset to your birth date once again.
 - If you initially skipped this step or can't remember the answer to your question, you must call Enrollment Management at (907) 786-1480 (select option 2, option 2) to have your PIN reset. You may also stop by the University Center with picture ID to have your PIN reset for you.
 6. Once you have logged into UAOnline, select "Student Services, Account Information."
 7. Next, click on "Registration" and then select "Register/Add/Drop Classes."
 8. Select the term in which you would like to register for classes.
 9. If you already know the CRN for the class you would like to register, you may enter it into one of the boxes located toward the bottom of the page. Next, click on "Complete Registration Changes" and skip directly to step 18 on this page.
 10. To search for classes, click on the "Class Search" button. You will be directed to a page titled "Class Schedule Search."
 11. First, select the term you are wanting to register for.
 12. Then, select your campus from the list provided. **If you would like to take a UAA course in Anchorage, at a Military Campus, or at the UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus select "UAA – Main Campus."** UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus classes are denoted with building locations "ER-228" and "CHHS".
 13. Select the type of course you are interested in taking, i.e. Distance (web) or Traditional (in-class lecture).
 14. Next, select the course subject(s) of the class(es) you are searching for.
 15. Once you have entered the information pertaining to your search, click the "Class Search" button at the bottom of the screen.
 16. The furthest left column titled "Select" is an important one. A "C" in the column stands for 'closed,' which means the class has reached its pre-determined capacity listed under the column titled "Cap." A box represents a course that students can still register for.
 17. Once you have decided on an available course you would like to register for, click inside the box on the left-hand side of the screen under the "Select" column.
 18. After selecting the box, scroll to the bottom of the screen and click on "Register." This will direct you back to "Register/Add/Drop Classes" page.
 19. If the class you registered for was available, and the system did not recognize any other conflicts/errors, you will notice a list of classes below the "Current Schedule" heading. Those are the classes you are now registered for.
 20. To search and register for additional classes, repeat steps 10 - 18. Please contact (907) 786-1480 (select option 3, option 2) if you have any questions about registration or need help troubleshooting.

Student Support Services

Academic Advising

- Academic advising is available on Tuesdays and Thursdays between 9:00am - 3:00pm. Walk-ins are welcome, but to assure adequate time with the advisor an appointment is recommended. To make an appointment, please call 907-694-3313.

Tutoring

- Tutoring is offered through the Learning Resource Center (LRC), located in Suite 228 of the Eagle Center, starting the second week of classes.
- Hard copies of the tutor schedule can be found on the LRC bulletin board, or in the UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus Administrative Office, located in Suite 115 of the Eagle Center. The tutor schedule can also be found online at eagle.uaa.alaska.edu, or on our Facebook Page.
- Tutors are paid by student fees, and are available to all UAA Students at no additional cost.

Learning Resource Center

- The UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus LRC is located in Suite 228 of the Eagle Center.
- The LRC is available to all UAA students. There are tables and comfortable chairs for studying. Computers are available with internet and the Microsoft Office Suite. Students can even print out assignments and research material on the LRC printer.

Open Computer Lab

- The UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus Open Computer Lab is located across the hall from the LRC in Suite 228 of the Eagle Center.
- The Open Computer lab is open to all UAA students. There 28 computers with access to the internet and equipped with the current Microsoft Office software. The hours of operation are posted next to the lab door.

Testing Center

- The UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus Testing Center is located inside the Eagle Center, right outside Suite 228. The normal business hours for the Testing Center is Monday through Friday, 8:00am - 5:00pm. The Testing Center can be reached via email at aycercetest@uaa.alaska.edu or by phone at 907-786-7612.
- The Testing Center offers proctoring for the Accuplacer placement test (Please see page 3 of this schedule for more information.) and all Distance Education tests. There is a \$20 fee for all non-UA test proctoring.

Prerequisites and Placement Tests

Prerequisites and Placement Tests

- Please refer to the current UAA Catalog or UAOnline.alaska.edu (follow the "Course Catalog" link) for information on prerequisites. You will be required to produce proof of test scores on the first day of class. If you do not have the appropriate AP, SAT, ACT scores, or the appropriate prerequisites, you will be required to take a UAA-approved placement test.

Prerequisites for Math and English Courses:

- In order to be placed into ANY Math or English Course, you must have either met the prerequisite or have received the appropriate score on the SAT, ACT or ACCUPLACER. If your test scores for the are more than 2 years old, you must take the ACCUPLACER.

ACCUPLACER:

- The ACCUPLACER is offered at the UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus Testing Center Monday, Thursday and Friday, 9:00am - 5:00pm. Tuesday and Wednesday the Testing Center is open 10:00am-7:00pm.
- The cost is \$15.00 per testing session and can include the Math and/or the English portion.

How to Calculate Tuition for a class

- 1. Find the course number**
 - This information can be found in any class listing. *Example: The course number for ACCT A101 is "101".*
- 2. Using the course number, find the correct price per credit hour**
 - A class with a course number of 101 would use the Lower Division price per credit hour, i.e. \$154 per credit hour.
- 3. Find the number of credits**
 - This information can be found in any class listing. See page 5 of this schedule for more information.
- 4. Multiply the number of credits by the price per credit hour**
 - Credits x Price per Credit Hour = Tuition
 - Example: ACCT A101 is a 3 credit class. The price per credit hour is \$154. The tuition for this class is \$462 (3 x 154 = 462).*
 - Please note that the tuition is not the total price for a class. The total price can be found by adding the tuition, any costs incurred by class fees, and misc. costs such as a parking permit. For more information see the "Fees" section below.**

Fees and Financial Information

Alaska Residency

- The UAA policy on Resident and Non-Resident Tuition may be found in the current UAA Course Catalog, which is available online at www.uaa.alaska.edu/futurestudents/residency.cfm
- Non-resident students who restrict their registration to no more than four (4) credits each semester are charged resident tuition.

 - Completed Applications, with appropriate documentation, must be submitted to UAA prior to the end of the published Add/Drop Deadline for regular semester-length courses.

Senior Citizen Tuition Waiver

- Senior Citizen Tuition Waivers are valid on a "Space Available" basis only, when courses can accommodate seniors in addition to regularly enrolled students. Senior citizens using the Senior Citizen Tuition Waiver may register for classes starting the first day of the semester.

- If you register for courses, UAA holds you financially responsible for that registration. UAA will NOT drop you from classes for non-payment. If you do not plan to attend, you must drop your courses within the 100% refund period to avoid assessment of tuition and fees.

- The UAA Chugiak-Eagle River Campus will now charge for all pages printed in the Learning Resource Center.
- The new printer will only work with a student's WOLFcard; it will not accept any method of payment other than a WOLFcard. Students can obtain a WOLFcard, i.e. Student ID, at the University Center. A student's first WOLFcard is always free.
- One page costs \$0.08 to print. Each semester a student enrolls in classes, \$10 will be deposited into their WOLFcard Printing

Secondary School Student Registration Process

To Complete the registration process, secondary students must:

1. **Must be completed only once.** Be admitted as a Secondary Student. See the "Admission and Enrollment" section on page 2 of this schedule for more information on how to get admitted to UAA.
2. **Must be completed only once, but must be signed by both student and parent/guardian.** Submit a signed *Secondary Student and Parent/Guardian Agreement Form*. Signatures denote agreement to abide by all student policies, procedures, and deadlines.
3. **This form must be completed for each secondary student registration transaction.** Obtain an instructor's signature on the *Secondary Student Registration Form*. The course instructor's approval is based on the instructor's judgment that the student meets factors 1 through 5 in the *University Determination* section of the *Secondary Student Registration Form*. Course instructors may require copies of high school transcripts and SAT, ACT, or an approved test to determine appropriate course placement. Faculty signatures only indicate permission to register and attend; this is not a guarantee of admittance into closed (full) course.
4. **Must be done every semester.** Complete a *Proxy for Registration Form* if someone other than the student is processing the request. This needs to be signed by the student and parent/guardian.
5. Submit above stated forms to the UAA Registrar or community campus director for review and final approval. The campus designee will review the student packet for completeness, assess the student's social and academic maturity, and readiness for success and safety in the courses requested.
6. Pay all tuition and fees associated with the selected course(s).
7. Adhere to UAA policies and procedures found in the UAA catalog and student handbook.
8. Attain a grade of at least "C" (2.0 on a 4.0 scale) from each UAA course to receive permission to register for future semesters.
9. Meet any additional program requirements established for secondary students at the community campuses.

Secondary Student Enrollment Guidelines:

- Enrollment may not exceed seven credits per semester prior to the first day of class. Beginning the first day of classes a secondary student may register for up to 19 credits (15 during the summer semester).
- Prerequisites for the courses requested must be met.
- Courses must be at the 200 level or lower (exceptions must be approved by the course instructor, department chair, and Dean, Director or designee).
- **Courses which are full require additional approval from faculty/instructor.**
- **Secondary students are accountable for all deadlines, including but not limited to add/drop, payment and withdrawal.**

Secondary Student Registration Forms

- The *Secondary Student and Parent/Guardian Agreement Form* needs to be completed only once. Both the secondary student and parent/guardian need to sign the form. The *Secondary Student and Parent/Guardian Agreement Form* can be found on page 14 of this schedule.
- The *Secondary Student Registration Form* needs to be completed for each secondary student registration transaction. The *Secondary Student Registration Form* can be found on page 15 of this schedule.

SECONDARY STUDENT AND PARENT/GUARDIAN AGREEMENT

The registration process at UAA requires all secondary student applicants and their parent/guardians to complete this Secondary Student and Parent/Guardian Agreement. This agreement identifies some of the issues encountered by secondary students and their potential impact but should in no way be considered comprehensive.

As a secondary student and parent/guardian of a secondary student, I understand and agree that:

- the University will not act in a parental or supervisory role.
- a secondary student who registers in University courses is fully responsible for complying with all policies and procedures of the University. This includes being aware of and adhering to the University Student Code of Conduct.
- a permanent University disciplinary record is established for all students who are found responsible for violating the Code of Conduct.
- courses taken will establish an official transcript that will follow the student throughout the student's college and/or university career. This may impact future admissions and/or ability to graduate with honors.
- regardless of age, FERPA rights are transferred to student upon registration. Parents/Guardians will not be able to conduct business on students' behalf or access student records without submitting the appropriate student information release or proxy registration documents (must be done annually). This includes but is not limited to access to grades, registration history and/or financial information.
- if a student decides to no longer attend a course, they must complete the necessary paperwork to drop or withdraw from that course. Failure to do so may result in a failing grade and/or financial obligations including late fees. Simply informing the instructor is insufficient.
- a secondary student who registers in University courses is responsible for maintaining at least a "C" in order to register for college level credit (2.0 on a 4.0 scale).
- university work is much more rigorous and much less guided than secondary education course work.
- adult themes and diverse perspectives are essential to University materials and discourse.
- a parent or guardian may not attend a course for which their secondary student is registered unless and until the parent or guardian is also officially registered for the course.

The University reserves the right to deny or discontinue the enrollment of a student in a course or courses if the University determines that the student lacks the maturity, the legal or intellectual ability or the academic preparedness to participate on an equal footing with other students, or if it is otherwise not in the legitimate interest of the University for the student to participate.

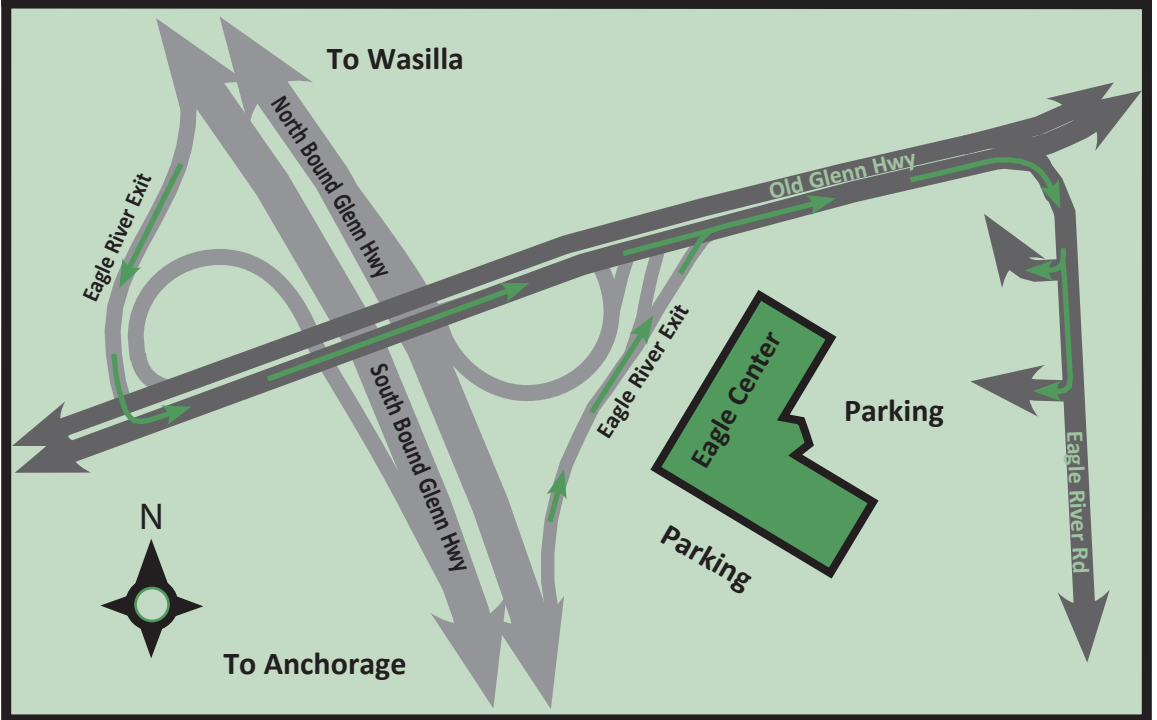
