Included is the recently revised course content guide for English A434, the History of Rhetoric. The revisions to the CCG reflect the requirements necessary to include the course in the “Integrated Studies” category of the General Education Requirements. The course revision process was supported through a small grant from the GER committee. As a result of the process, English A434 meets the criteria necessary to serve as a GER course. The changes reflect the stated Department of English desire to provide such a course.

Specifically, as the included “course outline” demonstrates, the course content emphasizes the study of connections between rhetoric and cultural institutions or practices which influenced its development. By focusing on these interconnections, the revised course invites students to explore rhetoric as a topic central to humanistic study in the Western tradition. Course activities and assessment practices have been altered to acknowledge the increasing importance of online and “new media” methods of communicating.

V. Guidelines for Evaluation

Evaluation is based on exams, in-class presentations, critical papers, a media analysis project, and participation in a discussion board and an online collaborative project.

VI. Course Level and Capstone Justification

This is an advanced course in English that requires students to have a background in writing and history. The theoretical material, research expectations, and reliance on independent thought make the course appropriate for the 400 level.

As the included course outline demonstrates, the course content emphasizes the study of connections between rhetoric and cultural institutions or practices which influenced its development. By focusing on these interconnections, this course invites students to explore rhetoric as a topic central to humanistic study in the Western tradition. Course activities and assessment practices acknowledge the increasing importance of online and “new media” methods of communication.
