III. Instructional Goals and Student Learning Outcomes

A. Instructional Goals. The instructor will:

- 1. Teach students about marine mammals and seabirds: where they originated from, their evolutionary history, and the anatomical, physiological, reproductive, and behavioral changes that resulted from their re-entry into the marine habitat.
- 2. Highlight the suite of morphological and physiological changes that have taken place that allow marine mammals and seabirds to exploit underwater and at-surface food resources, and explain how foraging behavior has shaped social evolution.
- 3. Emphasize how reproductive strategies are closely tied to evolutionary history, foraging ecology, and social organization for marine mammals and seabirds.
- 4. Convey the critical role that marine mammals and seabirds play in marine ecosystems, and make students aware of how human activities are impacting marine mammal and seabird populations throughout the globe.
- 5. Provide detailed examples of how the anatomical and physiological traits of marine mammals and seabirds are uniquely linked to their habitat, and of how changes in that habitat may influence species diversity and abundance.
- 6. Relate all of the above to current issues in Alaskan marine ecosystems and resources with a focus on balancing the many values represented in our environment.
- 7. Teach students how to evaluate and integrate information from a variety of different sources and perspectives.

AKNS A109B tlingit Orthography will be offered this fall. It is in the fall 2016 schedule. The Tlingit language courses are offered every other year and the last time we offered it - the course only had 7 students enrolled and was cancelled per the Dean's policies.

We are offering the Tlingit language courses next academic year, including the AKNS A109B

AKNS A109C Alaska Native Language Orthography is a course that includes Alaska Native languages that are being offered at the Branch campuses, primarily KoC and KPC. These two branch campuses are developing Ahtna and Dena'ina language courses and this would be part of their suite of offerings. There have been recent hires at these two branch campuses and as the new faculty there start offering these courses, this class will be important.

Justification to retain DN A490: We would like the option to use this special topics class in the upcoming years.

DNCE A245 Dances of West Africa II – It is OK to let this course be purged. It is not the only prerequisite for DNCE A365. It is one on a menu of choices. At present, there is no longer the demand for this course. When demand returns, this course will be re-envisioned.

DNCE A205 Fundamentals of Ballet II – Only in this past year was I able to identify a qualified teacher for this course after our other qualified teachers left the state. I envision this course will be able to be offered again in the spring of 2017.

FIRE A216 Instructional Methodology is a professional certification awarded by the State of Alaska as well as the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress. The FEST Program occasionally awards non-traditional credit for the certificate and therefore FIRE 216 benefits non-traditional learners.

Justification to retain FREN A310, Selected Topics: Literary Trends and Traditions: The Department of Languages has been unable to offer this course due to lack of staff to teach it. However, the course addresses a critical need of French majors and minors, and is an integral part of the French program at UAA. The department intends to offer the course in the near future, and therefore, would like to retain it.

Peninsula Field studies: The Geological Sciences Dept is currently searching for 2 new positions in geology and are planning to hire for next fall semester. One of the searches is for a geophysics position and that faculty member is expected to teach geophysics courses including the above GEOL 475 next year. We would like to save this class so that it does not have to be resubmitted by the new faculty.

GEOL 381 was developed and taught by myself for several years. During the last few years I have been responsible for teaching GEOL 481- Alaskan Field Investigations during the semester I previously taught GEOL 381. It is expected that the 2 new hires in geology will help teach GEOL 481, so that I would be able to again teach GEOL 381 within the next 2 years. So please allow us a little latitude before purging GEOL 381.

Justification to retain HS A499 – Senior Thesis: The Bachelor of Science in Health Sciences is a new degree (approved 2012) with a total of 13 graduates between the Spring 2015 and Fall 2016 semesters. We have more than 400 declared "pre-majors" and around 30 declared majors at this time: we anticipate some of these upcoming students will complete a Senior Thesis through our department and need the HS A499 course to facilitate their work.

JPN A310 should be purged.

Retain MT A124 Small Wooden Boatbuilding from the purge list. This is a course offered by KPC/Kachemak Bay.

Justification to retain RUSS A205: The Russian program is currently being restructured and the Department would like to maintain the course until further curriculum decisions have been made.

SOC A342 (Sexual/Marital/Family Life) be removed from the purge list. One of our faculty members is currently updating that course and we have tentative plans to offer it in Spring 17.

SOC A387 (Gay & Lesbian Lifestyles) be removed from the purge list. Our department has plans to update this course.

Justification to retain SPAN A470, Spanish Linguistics: History of the Language: The Department is offering the course in fall 2016.

ATA A290 Selected Topics in Aviation Technology is a course that allows for the Aviation Technology programs to have flexibility at an undergraduate level to offer unique courses and topics. While it has not been used in a number of years, its possible use for different course materials at a level below senior standing is useful to keep the students knowledgeable about upcoming and new aviation concepts.

The aviation industry is in continuous flux, with both changes in policy and changes in technology coming at a rapid pace. As such, this course would allow topics on a new technology or shifts in the industry while the foundational courses are changed to accommodate the new concepts. Two examples of this would be an introduction to future navigation concepts or Unmanned Aerial Systems. Not only are these topics current but also are changing. However, since the topics are changing so rapidly they are being transitioned into the more classical topics and courses at a slower pace. However, these topics would be good as a 290 Selective Topic. While neither truly fit the requirements for an upper division class but are not yet fully flushed out enough for a full course.

It is because of the flexibility that the ATA A290 course allows, without adding any cost to the program or department, we would like to remove it from the purge list. Thanks you for your time.

Comments:

I am writing to request that two economics courses not be purged from the catalog. Below I provide justification for each course.

Econ A429, Business Forecasting: Business Forecasting has not been taught for the last several years due largely to a lack of faculty resources. This is my first year serving as Chair and making this course content available to CBPP students is a priority. Within the last few months Assistant Professor Angie Zheng, who has extensive experience in time series data analysis and in business forecasting, expressed an interest in teaching the course. Prior to the course purge notification we made plans for Prof. Zheng to teach the course in Fall 2017. In addition, we are gaining a new ISER economist with extensive background in data analytics; his addition provides greater flexibility in covering data oriented courses.

Taking either Econ 429 or Econ 312 (Econometrics) is required for Economics majors, Finance majors, and Marketing majors; in addition, both courses have historically been popular electives for other CBPP BBA majors. Business Forecasting focuses on analyzing time series data and forecasting future events (e.g. sales or revenue) while Econometrics is a broader introduction to regression analysis and emphasizes use of cross-sectional and panel data - time series is not typically covered in econometrics. Given the explosion in the availability of firm level data, businesses across the country expect greater aptitude from business professionals in data analytics relative to years past. Preserving Econ 429 will allow us to maintain and eventually reconfigure an important course option for business students.

Econ A640, Economics of Transportation: This course has also not been taught for the last few years due to a lack of faculty resources. Economics of Transportation is particularly valuable for Masters students in the Global Supply Chain Management MS program; it is also a popular elective for MPA and MBA students. Professor of Logistics, Dr. Darren Prokop, who has a PhD in Economics, has requested to teach this course in Spring 2017 and I fully support his request and don't foresee any reason this course cannot be offered.

At the same time, we believe that in order to be responsive to a changing university, UAB needs to be flexible and adaptive to needs and circumstances as they arise.

While we envision the values of the Board to be relatively stable, we believe that an ongoing conscious consideration of our values, priorities, and processes ensures that we continue to work in a way that reflects those values and priorities. Therefore, it is our intent that this document be a flexible and adaptable guideline for the priorities, procedure, and processes of the Undergraduate Academic Board.

Reflection Questions

UAB Values

UAB Values Statement:

The Undergraduate Academic Board is dedicated to a shared, rigorous, open, and critical inquiry of curricular excellence in a collegial framework that fosters intellectual vitality and creativity.

UAB values are grounded in both academic integrity and process integrity.

Academic integrity encompasses the values of inclusiveness and innovation, as well as intellectual excellence, rigor and vitality/currency/relevance.

Process integrity includes the values of inclusiveness, fairness and transparency, as well as collaboration, honesty, respect and constructive feedback.

UAB Priorities, Procedures and Processes Statements

- The purpose of the priorities, procedures and processes statements is to clarify and support the values statement, to show the values at work.
- It is a priority of the Board to represent the academic values of our peers across the University, including the community campuses.
- We endeavor to serve UAA's diverse and intellectually curious faculty in the creation of opportunities for student success.
- In our efforts to both represent and support our peers, it is our goal to work collaboratively with faculty initiators and to offer respectful and constructive feedback as we review curriculum, programs, and policy changes or adoptions.

UAB Priorities

Institutional

- Accreditation: UAB works with the Office of Academic Affairs on accreditation.
- UAB's curricular review processes directly support Teaching and Learning (UAA's Core Theme #1) as well as Student Success (UAA's Core Theme #3).
- Academic policy changes and/or adoptions: UAB works with the Office of Academic Affairs and the University Registrar on academic policies and procedures.

 Curriculum coordination: UAB works with the Governance Office, the Office of Academic Affairs, the Graduate Academic Board, the Academic Assessment Committee, the College Curriculum Committees, and Department Curriculum Committees and Chairs.

Board specific Priorities

Curricular excellence

Intellectual vitality requires that course offerings remain current with advances and discoveries in the scientific, humanistic, and artistic disciplines associated with undergraduate degrees offered at UAA.

- Curriculum currency and vitality
- Rigorous, open and critical review of curriculum

Collaboration

Faculty members are the core of the institution and their work on curriculum development is among the most significant work of the university. It is a goal of UAB to inform and facilitate the development of excellent curriculum.

- Create a seamless process to help faculty initiators navigate the UAA curriculum process
 - Seek ways to minimize "paperwork" response to UAB by approving CAR/CCGs with minor changes so that the documents move forward rather than making them return to the Board.

Transparency

Be clear and consistent in both stating and following the Board's procedures and processes.

Academic policy

UAB is the core of academic policy development and is at the forefront of changes in academic policy and programs. As the university grows and changes, UAB is privileged to guide faculty in developing and integrating programs into the curriculum.

It is the goal of UAB to contribute to and support excellence in the university. At the same time that UAB oversees the development of programs, it is also oversees the deletion of programs as the university evolves.

UAB Procedures The established or expected way of conducting business of the Board.

Non Curricular Review Meetings

- Introductory Meeting
 - 1. The first meeting of the Academic Year
 - 2. The Board begins the Academic Year with a priorities, procedures, and processes meeting.
 - 3. Board welcomes new members.
 - 4. New and returning members review and update previous year's priorities, procedures, and processes in light of the Board's values.
 - 5. Chair reviews and explains priority group member selection process.
 - 6. Board discusses the role of the priority groups in curriculum groups.
 - 7. This review and update should help orient new members and should also help returning members to keep focus on the Board's priorities throughout the year.
 - 8. Due dates for curriculum are reviewed, as set with UAA governance.
- College and Campus Curriculum Chairs Meeting
 - Generally scheduled in September this is a meeting with the college and campus curriculum chairs to discuss UAB priorities and to talk about college and campus concerns and priorities
 - Recommendations are discussed with the college and campus curriculum chairs for setting due dates for curriculum at the college and campus level in agreement with UAA governance calendar.
- Fall Joint UAB/GAB meeting
- Spring Joint UAB/GAB meeting
- Final Meeting of the Academic Year
 - 1. Board reflects on values, priorities, procedures and processes over the year.
 - 2. Summary of work is prepared for submission to faculty senate.
 - 3. Chair is elected for upcoming academic year.

<u>Curriculum Review Meetings</u>

- 1. Chair assigns curriculum to "priority" groups for review of substantive issues.
- 2. First and second readings.
- 3. Presence of faculty initiator (or proxy) is required to conduct course review.
- 4. If faculty initiator or proxy cannot answer the board's questions, the review will be postponed.

UAB Curriculum Review Processes

The series of actions that the Board undertakes in conducting its business—this is what happens, or the step-by-step operation of the Board.

- 1. Faculty initiator (or proxy) is present;
- 2. Faculty initiator is invited to make a brief presentation on the curriculum brought for review;
- University Registrar and Scheduling make comments, if necessary;
- 4. Priority team members ask questions, make comments, and/or offer suggestions for clarification/coherence/alignment of curricular documents focusing on substantive issues;
- Non-priority team members ask follow up questions and make comments and suggestions;
- 6. Faculty initiator has the opportunity to answers questions, respond to comments and suggestions, and to take notes; with the faculty initiator's approval, the governance staff makes changes in the Curriculum Inventory Management (CIM) system
- 7. Board actions or motions are as follows:
 - First reading (one of the following):
 - Action: Accept for first reading.

<u>OR</u>

- Motion: Approve at first reading and forward to faculty senate.
- Second reading:
 - Motion: Approve and forward to faculty senate.
 - Board may choose to move to reject a course.

- 8. Board makes a motion to either:
 - waive first, approve for second;
 - approve at first reading
 - to accept for first reading only;
- 9. Board approves/not approves a motion;
- 10. Curriculum, programs, policy changes/adoptions proceed to Faculty Senate for final approval by faculty senators
- 11. When UAB approves programs for deletion, the Chair of UAB formally recognizes the contributions that these programs and their faculty have made to the University when presenting the action for final approval by the Faculty Senate.

Common motions at UAB

First Reading Motions

- "Move to accept for first reading"
 - the curriculum has been reviewed and the faculty initiator is requested to bring the curriculum back to the Board for a second reading
- "Move to approve at first reading and forward to faculty senate."
 - the curriculum is approved by the Board and is ready to move forward to Faculty Senate

Second Reading Motions

- "Move to approve and forward to faculty senate"
 - the curriculum is approved by the Board and is ready to move forward to the Faculty Senate

General motions

- "Move to postpone"
 - members of the Board believe that it would be beneficial to postpone the review, for example, if a proxy for the faculty initiator is unable to answer relevant questions
