MISSION AND ORGANIZATION

Area Health Education Centers (AHECs) are academic and community-based partnerships engaged in primary care workforce engagement, training, recruiting and retention activities to improve the distribution, diversity, supply and quality of the healthcare workforce.

The national AHEC Program is funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration, Bureau of Health Workforce (HRSA). The Alaska AHEC began at the University of Alaska Anchorage in 2005 and was the first in the country to be awarded to a School of Nursing, rather than a School of Medicine. There are now six regional centers in the state that conduct educational activities to engage and expose students to primary care delivery in rural or underserved settings, and to provide Continuing Education/Professional Development (CE/PD) to current health professionals.

Rebecca Bruntz is the new Director of Interior AHEC. Rebecca previously worked as the Education Outreach Specialist for the







HEALTH CAREERS PROMOTION AND PREPARATION

Health Careers Promotion and Preparation (HCPP) engages Alaskans of all ages into health careers through hands on and engaging activities from exploration camps and HOSA chapters in high schools to PATH, Academies with Cook Inlet Tribal Council and Alaska Job Center participants earning entry level credentials.

Our best prospect of "Growing our Own" healthcare professionals must start in the formative years when youth are still in the process of discovering who they are and who they want to be. The Alaska AHEC values this approach to healthcare workforce development. Despite the federal transformation of the AHEC program to shift focus primarily on students enrolled in health care training programs, the Alaska AHEC worked diligently to secure additional funding and partnerships to continue this crucial work with special focus on our most rural and underserved communities. The Alaska AHEC implements intensive camps working closely with school districts and communities to help students explore healthcare careers. The SC AHEC works with statewide HOSA (Future Health Professionals) chapters, conferences, and events. In addition, the AHEC Program Office supports University of Alaska Anchorage recruitment initiatives such as Academic Preview Day and Academic Insight Day, dedicated to exposing students to the wide array of health programs available and encouraging the application and enrollment process. *Alaska AHEC... AHEC SCHOLARS PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

In our last Annual Report, we provided a brief preview of the AHEC Scholars Program, a new initiative the AHECs were tasked with launching upon renewal of our competitive continuation grant funding. The vision for this national program is to increase the diversity and distribution of the healthcare workforce by providing health program students with community based learning experiences in rural and underserved communities. Experiences can be purely clinical or can be public health based activities such as health fairs, community screenings or immunization clinics. These experiences are paired with relevant didactic training on specific core topic areas such as interprofessional education, behavioral health integration with primary care, social determinants of health, practice transformation and cultural competency. Each state also had the opportunity to include additional topics of specific interest to their stakeholders. Here in Alaska, additional topics such as geriatrics, trauma informed care, chronic disease, substance use disorders, oral health and suicide prevention were also approved.

The Alaska AHEC worked diligently with stakeholders including students, faculty, and health professionals to develop the Alaska AHEC Scholars Program. The program planning began with focus groups and needs assessments aligning the goals and requirements set forth by the Health Service and Resources Administration (HRSA), federal funders for the AHEC Program, and the unique needs and circumstances of the state. The planning year culminated with a summer pilot including 25 students and provided an opportunity to test processes, didactic content and potential placement sites.

The Alaska AHEC Scholars Program launched in

August 2018 with a total of 75 participants from 18 different majors including nursing, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, pharmacy, social work and human services (to name a few). Participants include both UAA main campus students and rural campus students from Fairbanks, Petersburg, Ketchikan and Juneau. The AHEC Scholars kickoff event took place in early September, which included a keynote by Andy Jones, from the Office of Substance Misuse and Addiction Prevention who also certified all attendees to use Narcan kits.

Thanks to generous support from the University of Alaska Anchorage and the Technical

Vocational Education Program, students are supported with stipends and travel support for their participation in the program. Thank you for supporting our future healthcare providers in their exploration of rural and underserved practice! 

To support health professional workforce retention and growth across Alaska, the AHEC provides continuing education and professional development (CE/PD) opportunities through partnerships with other health organizations, associations, and state programs or by developing individual events. Highlighted topics for FY 2018 included:

- Mental Health First Aid Providing community members and health professionals the skills to recognize and assist others who are dealing with a Mental Health problem or crisis.
- Colorectal and Breast Cancer Screening Assisting the American Cancer Society and State DHSS Public Health office to improve screening rates and outcomes.
- Opioid Abuse Training Partnering with UAA Department of Human Services, Alaska DHSS Public Health and JAMHI (Juneau Alliance for Mental Health) to help decrease Opioid use and addiction.
- **Geriatric Education** Annual coordination of twenty 1.5 hour weekly webinars broadcast from the University of Washington to host sites across Alaska.
- HPV Vaccinations In partnership with the American Cancer Society, Alaska
 DHSS and other stakeholders to improve HPV vaccination rates in Alaska. This
 is a multi-year National AHEC Organization (NAO) project funded by the Center
 for Disease Control (CDC).

FEATURED PARTNERSHIP: AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY



Since 2016 the American Cancer Society has partnered with the Alaska AHEC Program Office on the CDC project to increase HPV vaccination rates in Alaska as well as other Northwest states. This partnership has included 28 trainings (live and webinar) and coordination

of the Alaska HPV Stakeholder Group. This partnership has also opened opportunities for training providers on Colorectal and Breast Cancer Screenings. The Alaska AHEC wishes to thank the American Cancer Society and it's staff for their dedication to the health and wellbeing of all Alaskans.




