JUSTICE REINVESTMENT AND ADOC

Current 2016 Costs:

	Yearly	Daily
Institutions (hard beds)	\$ 51,527.05	\$ 141.17
Community Residential Centers (soft beds)	\$ 36,178.80	\$ 99.12
Electronic Monitoring	\$ 7,840.20	\$ 21.48
Probation & Parole	\$ 3,149.95	\$ 8.63

- Minorities overrepresented
- Increase in nonviolent offenders (serving more time)
- Increase in female and elderly prisoners
- Increase in pretrial offenders and supervision violators

System cannot sustain as is:

Over capacity prison system

Displaced Native Alaskans

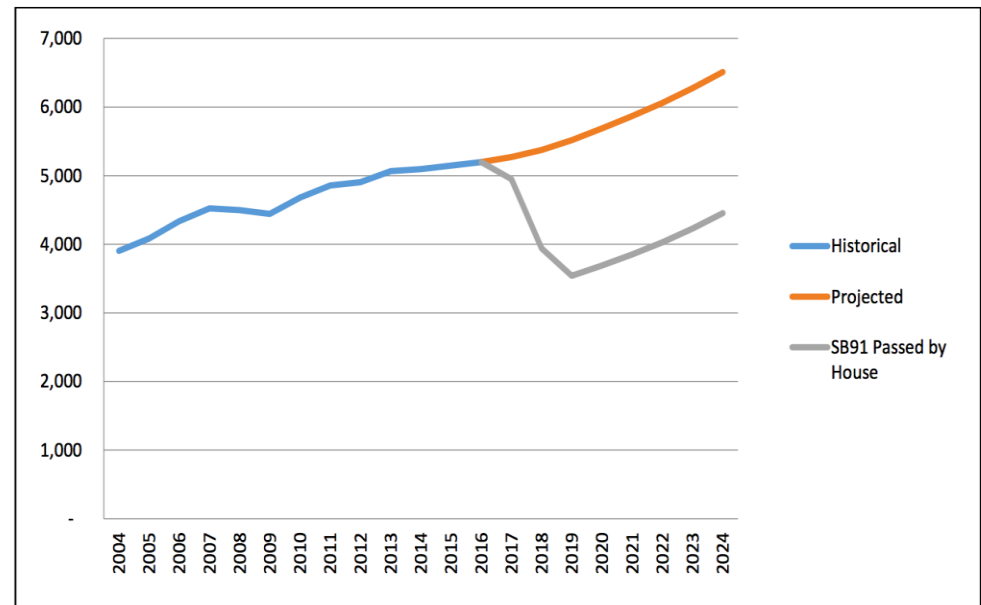
Need for increased access to treatment and services

Current efforts expected to avert projected prison growth through 2024 and reduce the average prison population by 13% saving an estimated \$380 million in State spending and reinvesting \$98.8 million

CURRENT EFFORTS WITHIN ADOC

- All Field staff are currently being trained on graduated sanctions and incentives
 - Institutional staff will be trained in effective case management skills
 - Amending policies and procedures to align with SB 91
 - Healthcare literacy is increasing in concert with more individuals applying for Medicaid
 - Establishing Medically Assisted Treatment program (MAT)
 - Looking into tele-medicine options to expand access to services in rural areas
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COLLABORATION; STATE AGENCIES AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

- Working with DHSS to establish process and tracking mechanisms for Medicaid applications
 - Working with DHSS and the Trust to continue and expand reentry coalitions efforts
 - Working with outside community partners and the reentry coalitions to establish in-reach procedures that are specific and individualized to case plans
 - Coordinating with different entities to track, record and analyze data and program outcomes
 - Working with Department of Labor for employment assistance and job training
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FUTURE OF ADOC

- Coordinated and timely referrals
- Continue integrated efforts to expand housing and employment options through community partnerships
- Peer support and recovery services
- Looking through the lens of trauma-informed care
- Identified opiate crisis in Alaska; what should future treatment and detox services look like?
 - **Decrease in recidivism rates; healthier families, neighborhoods and communities**
