ANJC Overview

- Alaska Native Justice Center (ANJC) was established in 1993, in response to Alaska Native's unmet needs regarding civil and criminal justice system.
- ANJC's mission is to promote justice through culturally- based advocacy, prevention and intervention initiatives that promote dignity, respect and humanity to all Alaska Natives.

Presentation Goals & objective

- To help Alaska Native communities make a long term and fundamental impact on the social norms of their community regarding alcohol consumption and substance abuse among youth
- □ To help local communities re-establish, promote and celebrate positive community social norms

What is Public Law 280?

- Enacted by the 83rd Congress in 1953 Public Law 83-280 (commonly referred to as Public Law 280 or PL 280) was a transfer of legal authority (jurisdiction) from the federal government to state governments. Congress gave six states (five states initially - California, Minnesota, Nebraska, Oregon, and Wisconsin; and then Alaska upon statehood) extensive criminal and civil jurisdiction over tribal lands

Barriers to success

- Establishing Tribal Courts
- Lack of local law enforcement
- Barriers to partnerships with State institutions
- Lack of recognition/legitimacy of Tribal Courts by State institutions

ANJC and the Third Judicial District Court in Anchorage

- ANJC was recognized by the Third Judicial
 District Court in Anchorage in 2008
- ANJC was designated as a CDP by the Third
 Judicial District Court at Anchorage in 2009
- ANJC has worked with 894 clients referred from the Third Judicial District Court in Anchorage
- 70% of all the clients referred to our agency are Alaska Native

DESIGNATION OF ALASKA NATIVE JUSTICE CENTER AS A COMMUNITY DIVERSION PANEL PURSUANT TO AS 04.16.050(B)(1)

AS 04.16.050(b)(1) authorizes the court to designate an organization as a community diversion panel and serve as a sentencing option for defendants convicted of a first minor consuming or possessing alcohol offense (if the court grants a suspended imposition of sentence). After consulting with the Alaska Native Justice Center (ANJC) and the Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP), the court hereby designates ANJC as a community diversion panel for minor possessing or consuming alcohol cases that originate in Anchorage.


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

State of Alaska Minor Consuming Statutes

- □ A Community Diversion Panel (CDP) is the court appointed monitoring agent identified by the Legislature to monitor 1st time offender MCA cases AS 04.16.050. (Also known as a Youth Court under Alaska State Statutes), a CDP is limited to working with first time offenders who receive a Suspended Imposition of Sentence (SIS) or a first time offender who receives a Conviction of Record (COR).


Outcomes of the 894 Court referrals




Outcomes of the 313 PTRP cases




Local and Rural Caseload



Demographics of Caseload




Age Demographic




Gender Age Demographic




Alaska Native Gender Age Demographic




Recidivism Rate First Time Offender




Combined Recidivism Rate




Alaska Native Recidivism %

Alaskan Impact of ICWA Workers

- On October 4, 2010, the Supreme Court ruled in favor of Tribal legitimacy in Alaska.
- The rule now is that Tribes have inherent jurisdiction to adjudicate the adoptions of their own members even outside of Indian Country
- Tribal Courts may if they so choose begin hearing misdemeanor cases in its community

A CDP and Tribal Courts

A monitoring agent or as we call it a Community Diversion Panel (CDP) can act as a monitoring agent for Tribal Courts for various misdemeanor cases, such as insuring that protective orders are carried out or that individuals convicted of assault follow through with treatment requirements as well as monitoring Tribal Court orders for minor consuming offenders.

Strengthening Tribal Courts/Social Norms

- A Tribal Court can strengthen its status by
- Partnering with the State law enforcement
- Adopting best practices that reflects its cultural values
- Establishing a monitoring agent/Tribal Diversion
 Panel that would receive referrals from the Tribal Court.
- Training the Tribal DP on data collection and reporting.
- Develop an MOU to share the tracking of data with the local Law Enforcement, treatment providers, and the State/Tribal Court.

How can ANJC work with Tribal?

- Advocating for regional State institutions to help the local community by
- By respecting their legitimacy and motivation for change on a local level
- Helping them to develop a Diversion Panel(DP) or monitoring program.
- Avoiding the "white knight syndrome"
- Training the Tribal DP on data collection and reporting.
