

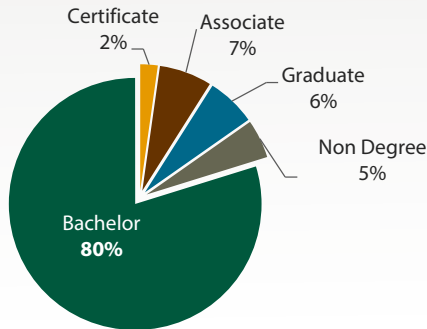
**DEFINITION**

This profile defines international students as non-U.S. citizens enrolled in a fall semester who require F1 or J1 visas to attend UAA.

Individuals seeking F1 student visas must be admitted to degree programs and must meet certain other requirements before the U.S. Customs and Immigration Services documents are issued. Once here, they must attend full-time.

Students holding J1 exchange visitor visas are typically not admitted to degree programs. Most of the international students included in this profile are holding visas obtained through UAA, but a few may be holding visas obtained through another university or organization.

**OVERVIEW**

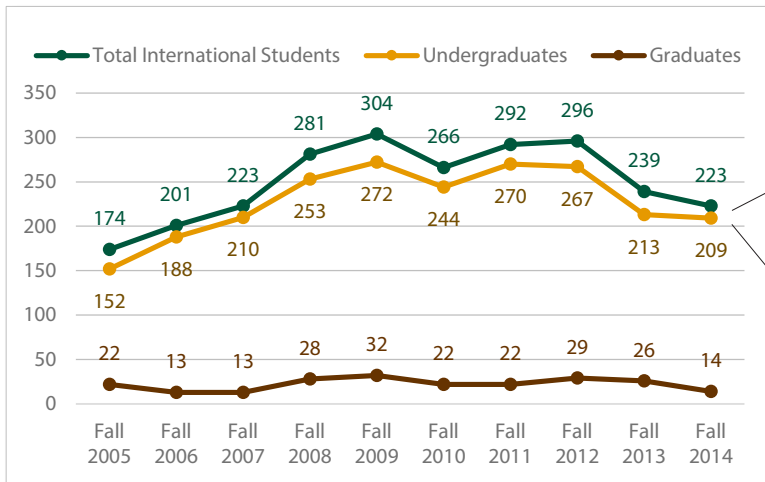
UAA welcomed 223 international students from 36 countries in Fall 2014, a 7 percent decline from Fall 2013 compared to a 5 percent decline in headcount for all students for the same time period.

Sixty percent of these international students come from three countries: South Korea, Canada and Russia. Fourteen more students from Canada were enrolled at UAA in Fall 2014 from Fall 2013, the largest number of Canadians attending in the last 10 years. Russia and Japan showed the biggest declines from Fall 2013 to Fall 2014 with each dropping by 8 students. The number of students from Russia has steadily declined from the peak enrollment of 104 students in Fall 2008. This decline can be attributed in part to the closing of the American Russian Center and the end of agreements to offer joint degree programs between the College of Business and Public Policy and universities in the Russian Far East.

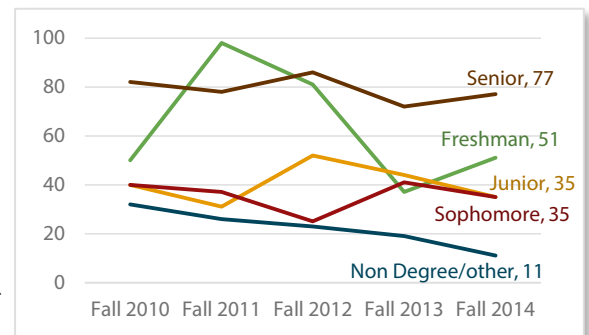
**GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS**

- 99%** Nearly all international students are enrolled on the Anchorage campus.
- 98%** All but five students are attending UAA on F1 visas.
- 93%** Nine out of ten are under the age of 30.
- 80%** The majority have been admitted to baccalaureate programs.
- 51%** Males continue to outnumber females, where the opposite is true of the total student population.
- 48%** Almost half paid non-resident tuition.
- 37%** Business programs continue to enroll the largest number of students.
- 37%** Asian/Pacific Islanders are the largest minority group.
- 27%** Are athletes—one third in track and cross country and just over one-quarter play hockey.

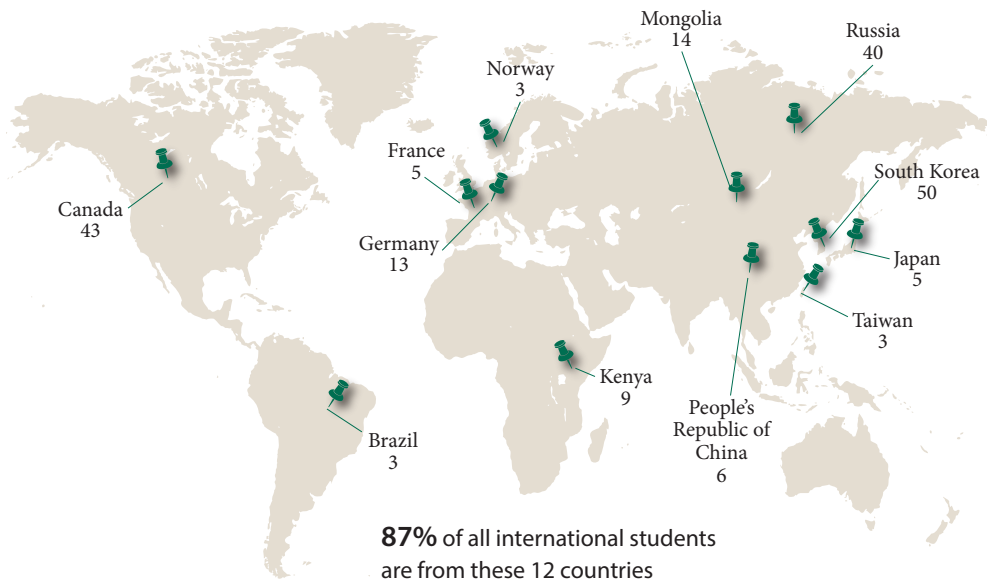
**INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ENROLLMENT TREND, FALL 2005-2014**



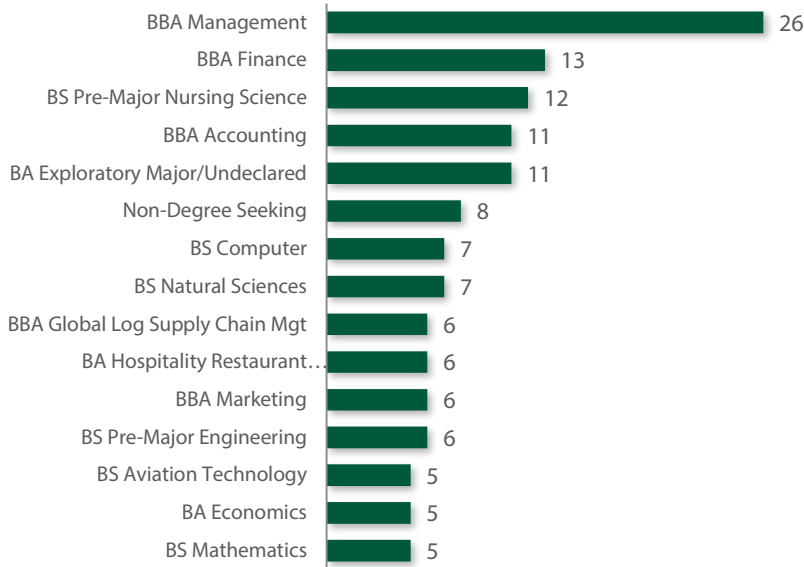
**INTERNATIONAL UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT ENROLLMENT TREND, FALL 2010-2014**



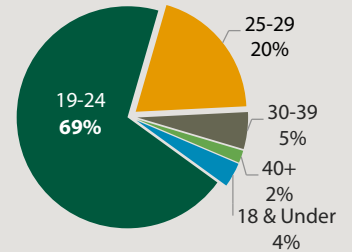
## TOP COUNTRIES OF ORIGIN



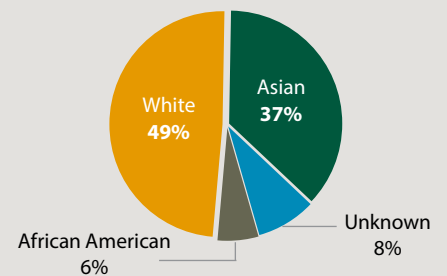
## TOP DEGREE PROGRAMS



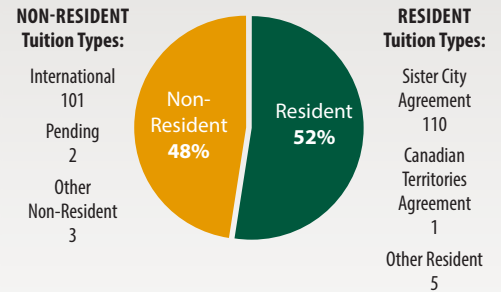
