Rachel had found what he was looking for and used the image that accompanied the story as the first Seawolf logo in 1977.

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

HONORARY DEGREE AWARD

DUKE RUSSELL

Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters

For as long as Duke Russell could remember, creating art has been serious business. The lifelong Alaskan famous for his "street-level" art style captures the essence of modernday life in Anchorage and has delighted all who've witnessed his colorful depictions of our northern city.

Russell's work has been exhibited in the Anchorage Museum, galleries throughout the city and the state, and trendy locals like the Spenard Roadhouse. His iconic "Spenardian" painting characterizes one of the city's most famous — or what some would call infamous — neighborhoods.

In addition to his artwork, Russell has immersed himself in Anchorage's local art scene. He strongly believes in art education and providing the city's youth opportunities to experience the joy of creating art. Russell has offered drawing and painting courses where he encourages his young students to nurture their talents, and he is dedicated to fostering Alaska's next generation of creatives and artists.

While Russell is well-known throughout the state for his art, his humanitarian work advocating for the city's vulnerable, unhoused population has recently inspired others to join his efforts. From assembling volunteers to coordinate access to essential care, services, food and shelter to providing daily soup kitchens at Anchorage's Centennial Park and volunteering to pass out meals at the Sullivan Arena, Russell is committed to making a difference and serving his community.

In 2022, Russell's art and activism were recognized by the Rasmuson Foundation, which awarded him the prestigious President's Award. Russell's work as an artist and civic engagement continues to inspire those in Anchorage and across the state.

MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD

JAN INGRAM

Meritorious Service Award

An lowa farm-raised elementary school teacher, Jan Ingram has led a remarkable life filled with adventure and advocacy. In 1959, Ingram and her husband embarked on an Alaska adventure, teaching in the remote village of Kwigillingok. This experience ignited her passion for education and helping to support the preservation of cultural identity in Alaska.

Ingram worked for the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs during the 1960s, taking on extraordinary tasks in various villages. She created "The Story Knife," the first Native arts instructional TV program in Alaska, bringing Alaska Native legends to life through her drawings.



Driven by her thirst for knowledge, Ingram earned advanced degrees and became a strong advocate for Alaska Native education. She played a pivotal role in establishing two-year degree programs for Yupik students in 53 villages.

But Ingram's dedication extended beyond education and the arts. She served as dean at Alaska Pacific University, led the Anchorage Opera, owned a radio station, contributed to Alaska Press Women and supported scholarship fundraisers

Ingram's life is a testament to the power of education, advocacy and pursuing one's passions. Her legacy lives on through her contributions to the state of Alaska and will continue for generations to come.

CATHLEEN "CASS" POOK

Graduate Student Speaker

When human services and social work alumna Cass Pook says she has always been a helper, she's not just referring to her nature as an empathetic and compassionate listener. Pook means that epigenetically — that memories of community service are ingrained in her core and passed down through generations, referencing past designated village helpers in her Tlingit tribe.



"Culturally, it's in my DNA to be a helper," said Pook. "Looking back on it throughout history, 100 or 200 years ago I would have been doing the same thing. I was born to be a social worker."

In this lifetime, Pook has had plenty of motivation to pursue human services and social work. Inspired by her mother and her social worker sister, who passed away in 2011, Pook went back to school in 2013 at the age of 51 after getting married and raising five children.

Even before returning to school, Pook was already building on her helpful nature by working as a patient access specialist at Southeast Alaska Regional Health Consortium (SEARHC) in Sitka, Alaska. However, in order to do more, she knew she needed to pursue higher education and take the torch from her sister.

First enrolling at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, Pook earned her certificate in rural human services in 2016, her Associate of Applied Science in human services in 2018 and her Bachelor of Arts in social work in 2022. At the same time, she began working as a chemical dependency counselor at Raven's Way, a SEARHC facility treating substance abuse in adolescents.

For her graduate degree, Pook not only transitioned to UAA, but also from SEARHC to the State of Alaska Department of Family and Community Services (DFCS). As project assistant on the complex care team, she works to place youths and adults into the appropriate support programs.

With her Master of Social Work, Pook hopes to continue serving her community through DFCS. For instance, in a secondary role as tribal liaison assistant, Pook is helping lead a pilot program to establish a Family Justice Center Alliance facility in Alaska.

Additionally, Pook plans on continuing her education by pursuing a doctorate in either law or tribal human rights, but only after a much-deserved break to welcome her seventh grandchild to the world.

"You have to remember that you can still learn from anyone if you're listening and paying attention," said Pook. "There's always room to learn more, to ask questions, to get feedback."

BAY ALABDULBAQI

Student Speaker

For Bay Alabdulbaqi, college has been a journey of discovery and transformation. She sees the speaker opportunity as a way to "express gratitude and be a mentor for other students" — the perfect culmination for her undergraduate experience.

Born and raised in Saudi Arabia, Bay was drawn to Alaska by a scholarship and the allure of untouched nature. Although she instantly fell for the cooler weather and scenery, it took a while before she found her place at UAA.



"The very first few years were the hardest for me. I didn't know anybody. I didn't have community. I wasn't really happy in my major," said Bay.

Driven by her interest in math and design, she initially studied engineering before switching to a major in psychology with a minor in math. In her new major, one class immediately stood out as her favorite: positive psychology, for its emphasis on thriving instead of simply coping.

She credits another light-bulb moment with improving her undergraduate experience. "I had an idea of finding the community I wanted. And then when that idea changed into, 'I'm not really going to find it. I'm going to create it.' — that's when it really got so much better for me."

After that epiphany, she made a deliberate effort to get involved. She joined the Psychology Club and took on a leadership role as chair of Club Council soon after. Initially shy and worried about the time commitment, Bay found the role more fulfilling than overwhelming. "Especially if I have the intention that, 'I'm doing this to create community. I'm doing this for me and for other students,'" she noted. The experience spurred Bay to get even more involved, joining the International Students Organization and working with Multicultural Student Services (MSS).

She's particularly proud of her work creating community with MSS, where she served as the first Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (JEDI) leader centering, celebrating and embracing people of marginalized identities and religions, as well as international students. Among her responsibilities as a JEDI scholar was serving as an orientation leader, guiding campus tours for new students. "It was really cool to turn my failures into lessons that I could share with other students and make their journey less lonely, less stressful."

She has a message for her fellow graduates as they continue life's journey: "Keep transforming. Keep growing and take everything you've learned here out in the world and make it a better place. Always contribute, always try to make the place you are in better."

ACADEMIC TRADITIONS

Robes, Mortarboards, Hoods

An academic legend tells of a wise old Greek who dressed his students in mason's sackcloth robes with mortarboards because, "Their destiny is to build. Some will build cities, some will build lives – perhaps one of them will build an empire; but all will be builders on the solid foundation of knowledge."

Whether or not the ancient Greek dressed his students in sackcloth and mortarboard, the academic robes worn today by graduates and faculty trace their beginnings to the mid-12th century, when small groups studied under the tutelage of a scholar (often a monk or priest). These students chose to dress in a robe similar to that of their teacher. Through the centuries, this traditional scholarly dress did not change much. Each individual scholar donned special colors, fur and fabrics, as did his students. In contrast to those Old World customs, today's academic robe has a basic organization that allows you to identify even more about the scholar.

Today's scholars are the university faculty. They wear academic robes with colorful hoods reminiscent of the medieval monk's cowl. The size and colors of the hood tell the observer what discipline the scholar pursued and from which college or university he or she graduated.

UAA master's degree graduates will be wearing their hoods today, for they have gone beyond the bachelor's degree to learn more and become scholars. The University of Alaska Anchorage's colors are gold and green, hence these colors on the hood. The velvet trim on the hood signifies the scholar's field.

Some colleges and universities use the soft beret, but the prevailing style of cap is the traditional square mortarboard, decorated with a long tassel. You may notice some faculty wearing a soft beret-style cap.

It does not matter whether the tassel is worn on the left or right of the mortarboard, but it is often customary to change the tassel to the other side after receiving the diploma.

While you may not be able to identify the origins of each specific academic robe and hood appearing in today's commencement ceremony, you can reflect that from the certificate graduate in his black gown to the Doctor of Philosophy, students and professors alike are paying homage to more than 800 years of academic tradition.

University Mace

The grand marshal carries the University of Alaska Anchorage mace in the commencement procession and places it in a stand on the stage during commencement ceremonies to signify the importance of the occasion. The UAA Alumni Association commissioned the mace in 1990 and two talented UAA employees created it. Dr. Vern Oremus, former dean of UAA's previous College of Career and Vocational Education, used a lathe to create the wooden staff and head. Associate Professor of Art Mariano Gonzales designed and produced the sterling silver torch at the top of the mace. The mace symbolizes UAA as a university of distinction and is traditionally entrusted to the faculty in recognition of their critical role in the education of our students.

GRADUATING WITH HONORS

UNIVERSITY HONORS

Associate and baccalaureate degree students who graduated with honors in summer 2023 and those students expected to graduate with honors in fall 2023 are wearing a gold honor cord. Throughout the program, they are recognized by the stars next to their names. Honors are indicated as follows:

To be eligible to graduate with honors, associate and baccalaureate degree-seeking students must first earn a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or above in all college work attempted at UAA. A transfer student who is earning an associate degree must complete a minimum of 15 resident credits with academic letter grades to be eligible to graduate with honors. A transfer student who is earning a baccalaureate degree must complete a minimum of 30 resident credits with academic letter grades to be eligible to graduate with honors. All transfer students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.50 or above in all college work attempted both at UAA and at all other accredited institutions attended and for all courses used to fulfill the degree program in order to graduate with honors. At UAA, graduation with honors represents a student's entire academic history. All grades and credits earned will be included in determining eligibility to graduate with honors (Ds, Fs, retaken courses, courses lost in academic bankruptcy, etc.). In addition, a student transferring coursework and grades must have a minimum of 70% of their credits submitted with letter grades to be eligible to graduate with honors. 


