# Want To Make A Difference? AHAINA Peer Mentors

AHAINA Student Programs is searching for upperclass students (sophomore standing and above) at UAA to become Peer Mentors to AHAINA students as they work on their G-3 plan. Your mentorship assists in helping students set Goals, maintaining good Grades, and focus on Graduation. Peer Mentors serve as a point-ofcontact for freshmen and sophomore students who may benefit from having an upper class student provide academic support through scheduled tutoring sessions, one-on-one mentoring, and assistance with general university issues.

The benefit of being an AHAINA Peer Mentor is the opportunity to make a difference in another student's

college experience. Sometimes, just having another student provide support, encouragement, and persistence can mean the difference between a positive and a negative college experience.

Peer Mentors are needed from all disciplines and backgrounds. Candidates must have at least a 2.8 GPA.

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# **AHAINA Supports Black Student Union (BSU)**

Students answered the call for additional peer-to-peer support for Black students with the creation of the Black Student Union (BSU) student organization. BSU exists to unite, advance, encourage and inform students of the African Diaspora. The creation of BSU at UAA marks the beginning of a national tradition

The first Black Student Union was formed at San Francisco State University by Jimmy Garrett and Jerry Varnado. Their

passion was the catalyst for the concept of a college advocacy group that would work toward the advancement of civil rights. Garrett and Varnado shared their passion with other colleges high schools.

"We did manage to play a role in a broader movement," says Varnado, a retired attorney. "There are Black Student Unions all over the world. I went to the London School of Economics to visit the Black Student Union."

The movement became

stronger when black students at other campuses adopted the name. "It was more than a name, and the lasting acronym BSU. That activity that they were leaders in didn't just shift San Francisco State. It shifted the access and the academic context of every university in the country," says Kenneth Monteiro, Dean of the College of Ethnic Studies at San Francisco State.

BSU meets in Rasmuson Hall, Suite 106. All UAA students are eligible to join BSU.

# **Black History Month on Congressional Record**

Black History month is a time of celebration at UAA but this year's events especially were memorable for AHAINA Student Programs and one of its community partners, the Anchorage Urban League.

On February 24, 2011, Senator Mark Begich presented a Congressional Record, Proceedings and Debates of the 112th Congress, First Session to AHAINA and the Urban League. The record was presented symbolically at the university's final Black History month event.

The Congressional Record consists of four sections: the House Section. the Senate section, the Extensions of Remarks, and (since the 1940s) the Daily Digest. At the back of each

daily issue is the Daily Digest, which summarizes the day's floor and committee activities and serves as a table of contents for each issue. The House and Senate sections contain proceedings for the separate chambers of Congress. The Extensions of Remarks portion of the Record contains speeches, tributes, and other information.

# **AHAINA Summer Bridge Program**

### Do you know a high school senior who plans to attend UAA in fall 2011?

AHAINA Student Programs is offering a great opportunity to help students prepare for their freshman year. The AHAINA Summer Bridge program provides the chance to enroll in a 100 level course and earn three college level credits that can be applied to the General Education Requirements at UAA. The five-week intensive summer session consists of PSY 111: General Psychology and college preparatory workshops and provides participants academic support through daily tutoring, mentoring, and college admissions assistance.

15 first-time freshman students were accepted into the 2010 Summer Bridging program. All participants successfully completed the college-level course for credit with 80% of those participants continuing into the spring 2011 semester in good academic standing.
