

Registrations By Mail

3. Your mail registration form, tuition and fees must be returned to KPCC by January 5. There will be no exceptions to this date.


4. You will not be allowed to register by mail for courses requiring instructor's signature, proof of placement test, or any similar restrictions. You must register in person for these courses.

*Nonresident students who enroll for 6 or fewer hours are considered residents for fee assessment purposes.

Undergraduate course fees are \$25 per semester credit hour. Graduate course fees are \$40 per semester credit hour.

Resident students enrolling in 7 credits or less will pay \$25 per credit for undergraduate courses, and \$40 per credit for graduate courses. Students enrolling in 8 or more credits will pay the consolidated fee of \$205 plus an additional \$13 for each graduate credit included in the total to a maximum of \$320.

Note: Courses which require the use of special materials, supplies or services may have a material fee in addition to the normal credit hour charge.

There are no tuition fees for Adult Basic Education/GED Preparation Courses.

The college reserves the right to change or add to its fees at any time. Fee assessments are subject to audit and correction, and any such adjustments will be made within thirty days following the close of late registration. Students will be notified of any adjustments.

TUITION AND REFUND POLICY

Students must officially drop or withdraw from classes in order to qualify for a tuition refund (except for cancelled classes). You will be allowed a refund for withdrawal from KPCC according to the following schedule:

SENIOR CITIZEN TUITION FEE

Alaska residents 60 years or older may enroll in any course offered by Kenai Peninsula Community College for which they are properly qualified and for which space is available without course credit hour charges. Lab fees, other special fees, and non-credit fees are not included in the waiver. All applicants for Senior Citizen Waiver must complete a "Tuition Waiver Request" form which is available in the Admissions and Records Office.

ADMISSIONS

Kenai Peninsula Community College, in the tradition of Community Colleges throughout the United States, maintains an Open Admissions Policy. In accordance with the Open Door Policy, students may be admitted if they meet any one of the following criteria:

- Have earned a high school diploma or the equivalent (GED Certificate).
- 2. Reached 18 years of age or older.
- Are a high school senior with written permission from parent/guardian and principal/counselor. (Limited to a maximum of 6 credits).
- A non-high school graduate who is eighteen years of age whose high school class has graduated.

A specific grade point average in previous high school or college is not required for general admission to the College. To be admitted to a Degree or Certificate Program, and before receiving a Degree or Certificate from Kenai Peninsula Community College, students must be formally admitted. To accomplish this formal admissions process, students must complete and submit an Admissions Application and \$10 to the Office of Admissions and Records.

CATALOG

There is a new catalog in effect which substantially changes the requirements of some degree programs. Students enrolled in a degree program may elect to graduate under the requirements of the general catalog in effect during the year of graduation or in effect at the time they originally declared a major, providing there has not been a time lapse of more than five years.

FINANCIAL AID

There are several types of funding available. Students in need of financial assistance should contact the Counseling Office.

In addition, a deferred payment plan is available for students who cannot pay the entire tuition charge at the beginning of the semester.

KPCC is a Veteran's Administration approved institution of higher learning and veterans enrolled at least half-time may receive monthly educational benefits. Veterans enrolled less than half-time will have their tuition and fees paid for by the Veterans Administration.

PLACEMENT TESTS

Students who plan to register for a Math or English class for the first time must take a Math and/or English Placement Test.

Kenai Peninsula Community College reserves the right to cancel, combine, to change the time, dates or place of meeting, and to make other revisions in this Class Offerings which may become necessary, and to do so without

If as many as six semester hours have been earned in an area covered by a CLEP General Examination, no credit will be awarded for the successful completion of that examination. The University of Alaska has a Honeywall 6000 computer which is available for student use at no cost. KPCC has several terminals that are connected to the Honeywell 6000. Some of the system languages available are Basic, Fortran, Cobol, Pascal and Spss.

One of the most used systems is MAIL, which permits students to correspond with other students anywhere in the state. Other beneficial functions of the computer include the ability to type and edit text i.e., class assignments, term papers.
